

Knowing the symptoms of male breast cancer could save your life. The best chances for treatment and ultimately survival occur when the disease is found in its earliest stages. If you are experiencing any symptoms or persistent breast changes you should report it to your physician.

The most common signs of breast cancer for both men and women are a lump, mass or thickening in the breast. Frequently the lump is painless. Other male breast cancer symptoms include but are not limited to:

- Skin dimpling or puckering
- Development of a new inversion (the nipple has turned inward) or indentation of the nipple
- Nipple discharge

Out of the Shadow of Pink was founded in 2005 when my husband was diagnosed with Stage IV Male Breast Cancer. For every 100 women with breast cancer, one man will develop the disease and he will be not only devastated but shocked and surprised.

The American Cancer Society estimated that 1,990 men would be diagnosed in 2009 and that 450 of those men will die.

Statistics also show that a higher percentage of men will die from breast cancer than women because they are typically diagnosed at a later stage.

Although it is still rare, the incidence of male breast cancer continues to increase.

Most men are still sadly unaware.

The chances for successful treatment and survival are best when breast cancer is found in its earliest stages.

Climb For Hope was organized to raise and channel funds toward a promising breast cancer vaccine being developed by Dr. Leisha Emens, MD, PhD at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, MD.

Dr. Emens and her team completed the first clinical trial combining the breast cancer vaccine with very low doses of chemotherapy in 28 patients with Stage IV breast cancer. They have learned that the vaccine is safe, bioactive, and produces new immune responses to breast cancer.
